LSU Class of 2017 Breaks All-Time Record

Largest, Most Diverse Class on Record for a Fourth Consecutive Year

LSU's 292nd commencement exercises marked a record-breaking graduating class comprised of more than 6,562 exceptional LSU graduates. The overall class of 2017 also included the most degrees awarded to women, African American and Asian American students. These students represented 53 Louisiana parishes, 48 U.S. states and 50 foreign countries. The size, scope, and caliber of this class demonstrates our university's unwavering commitment to student success.

Wetlands Warrior Wins National Award


LSU Professor and Louisiana Sea Grant Executive Director Robert Twilley is the recipient of the 2017 National Wetlands Award for Science Research from the Environmental Law Institute. He was selected for the honor in recognition of his tireless efforts to save Louisiana's coast, including his leadership role in developing the Louisiana Coastal Protection and Restoration Authority, which led to the state's first-ever master plan for protecting the coast.



LSU Researcher Takes Top 10 with Discovery of new Species

LSU Museum of Natural Science Curator of Mammals Jake Esselstyn is part of a team that described one of the International Institute for Species Exploration's <u>Top 10 New Species</u> of 2017. Esselstyn and his colleagues have discovered a new genus and species of rodent on the island of Sulawesi in Indonesia.

Over the last decade, faculty at LSU's Museum of Natural Science have discovered 65 previously unknown species.



LSU Alums Take Crawfish Into the 21st Century

Ryan and Laney King have made buying crawfish as simple as downloading an app -- their app, to be precise. The <u>Crawfish App</u> allows users to search for live or boiled crawfish based on the price, reviews and their location. It's not just southeastern vendors listed on the app.

Both members of the King family are LSU alums. Ryan studied engineering and Laney studied finance. Laney also received her MBA from the E. J. Ourso College of Business, and Ryan is currently a third-year law student at the Paul M. Hebert Law Center.
