
#### LSU's LIGO Research Wins Nobel Prize

The 2017 Nobel Prize in Physics was awarded to the pioneering leaders of the Laser Interferometer Gravitational-wave Observatory, or LIGO, for the first detection of gravitational waves. LSU faculty and students were instrumental in this discovery, which sent shockwaves across the international scientific community when discovered in 2015. It is considered the scientific breakthrough of the century.






# LSU Researcher Secures \$2 Million to Improve Behavioral Health

More than **20**% of Louisianans are currently living with mental illness, and our state is among those with the highest prevalence of behavioral health issues and the lowest rates of access. LSU's Scott Wilks of the School of Social Work recently secured nearly **\$2 million** from the U.S. Department of Health & Human Services to increases Louisiana's social work labor force to meet the state's increasing needs.

# **LSU Graduates Buck National Debt Trends**

The average college student graduates with approximately \$30,000 in debt -- unless, of course, they graduate from LSU. Two out of three Tigers leave our campus with zero debt.

Those that accrue any debt do so at levels much lower than the national average.

And because our graduates also make higher than average starting salaries, they leave the university well-positioned to start their careers unburdened by debt and supported by a degree that only grows in value over time.

Duncan is a 1997 graduate of the LSU Paul M. Hebert Law Center and practices law in Washington, D.C. Engelhardt, a 1985 graduate, is currently chief judge of the U.S. District Court for the Eastern District of Louisiana.



# LSU Alumna Funds \$2 Million Endowed Chair in School of Music

Janice Harvey Pellar, LSU '73, has established the Janice Harvey Pellar Chair in Voice and Keyboard in LSU's College of Music & Dramatic Arts to ensure the university's ability to attract and retain the most competitive faculty in the field. It is eligible for matching funds through the Louisiana Board of Regents' highly competitive Endowed Chairs for Eminent Scholars program, bringing the ultimate impact of the Pellars' gift to \$2 million.

Janice is the former owner and CEO of technology provider EMCO Technologies. She purchased the company from her parents in 1988 and grew it from 30 local employees to a nationwide technology provider. She credits her passion for voice and keyboard to her experience at LSU. She and her husband, Gerald, a 1974 LSU alumnus, have loyally invested in the college for nearly 30 years.

# LSU Grads Earn \$12,000 More than Competitors

Recent rankings demonstrate that LSU remains highly competitive in the metrics that matter most to students: outcomes.

According to PayScale's 2017-18 College Salary Report, **LSU leads the state** in both early and mid-career graduate salaries, ranks third in the SEC and 21st among flagship universities.

Washington Monthly's recently released 2017 College Guide and Rankings also place LSU as the highest ranked university in Louisiana, and fifth in the SEC.

The Washington Monthly rankings come on the heels of LSU being recognized by Kiplinger's Personal Finance in the 2017 "Best College Value" rankings. For in-state

students, LSU is rated 65 among Kiplinger's **Top 100 Public Colleges**, putting LSU as the highest rated public university in Louisiana.
